
In a similar manner, both the existing town garage and fire department buildings are less than ideal for our needs. Trucks have grown in size over the years, and water and sanitary facilities in the current town garage are lacking. The Fire Department building is in need of some significant repairs and energy efficiency improvements, and the Fire Department is hampered in borrowing funds for building improvements because they do not actually own the land that the firehouse sits on. Perhaps a joint-use Fire Department and Municipal Equipment building would better suit our needs going forward.

Furthermore, the existing salt shed is in dire need of extensive renovation.... the middle wall is all but gone. Here again, a more suitable site away from the center of town would be advantageous, and would go a long way toward alleviating some of the water flow issues experienced by the Community Church.

As you can see, there are several pressing issues that really are of critical importance to your Town. We welcome any suggestions and possible solutions, and wish to remind everyone that the Select Board meets every second and fourth Thursday of the month at 7:00 PM at the Town Clerk's Office on the green. We also need to fill an auditor position to round out the 3-member Board of Auditors. 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



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### **Planning Commission News**

Consultant Selected For The Creative Economy Project

Kathy Letendre, a Middletown Springs resident and independent consultant, has been selected as the consultant to assist in the project to establish a Creative Economy organization in Middletown Springs. The project is funded by a \$7800 Municipal Planning Grant awarded to the town in December 2014 by the Vermont Department of Housing and Community Development.

Over the past several months the creative economy steering committee researched and spoke to potential consultants including the Rutland Regional Planning Commission and sent out a Request for Qualifications to five consultants. The committee selected Kathy and passed that recommendation on to the select board where it was approved on March 26th.

Kathy's selection and future work will build upon the earlier volunteer work she did with the committee and a community group last year. The work plan for Kathy and the Steering Committee includes meeting with the Steering Committee and Planning Commission, analyzing existing data and other research, meeting with targeted individuals, groups and/or organizations, and developing the creative organization, mission, vision, image and marketing plan.

Kathy is an independent consultant as well as a consultant with the Institute for Quality Advancement. Prior to her consulting roles she was Vice President of Planning & Organizational Excellence at the Rutland Regional Medical Center.

Steering Committee members include Nick Seidner - Rising Meadow Pottery, Ryan Mahar - Mahar Maple Farm, Marie Louka - Madrugada Farm LLC, Nora Rubinstein - Teleidoscope Group LLC and Beth Miller - Independent Consultant. Anyone interested in serving on the Steering Committee should contact any one of them. There is a role for everyone interested and all are welcome at committee meetings. In addition to the committee, Select Board member Herb Childress is the municipal authorizing official and Planning Commission member Tom Hurcomb is the grant administrator for carrying out the grant program within state guidelines.

# School Directors (Regular) Meeting February 10, 2015 - Official Minutes

- **1.** Call to Order Clarence Haynes called the meeting to order at 6:05PM.
- **2. At 7:00PM** the regular meeting will be suspended in order to conduct the School Board's Public Informational Meeting, after which the regular meeting will resume.
- **3. Additions, Deletions, Changes to Agenda -**"Student Concern" needs to be added under #13 (Executive Session).
- **4. Preparation for Public Informational Meeting** Discussed which documents would be distributed to people attending the meeting, as well as slides and talking points.

Budget deficit was caused by secondary costs (tuition and special education expenses) which came in \$164,000 over budget. Some of this was made up by spending reductions in the elementary budget. We saved \$64,000 in the elementary budget, used \$31,000 from the Tuition Fund, and also used some special education reimbursement funds. These measures brought the deficit down from \$164,000 to approximately \$48,000.

Discussed what common questions might be brought up during public forum.

Primary expenses behind the elementary school budget are salaries, health insurance, plant maintenance, food service program, homework club.

The Board does not intend to harm the elementary school programs in order to pay for secondary education.

Discussed potential savings/costs of changing supervisory unions.

**5. Consent Agenda:** Approval of Minutes –January 20, 2015 (Regular) and January 26, 2015 (Special)

Clarence Haynes moved to approve the meeting minutes of January 20 and January 26, with the following corrections/additions to the Jan. 20 minutes: Meredith Morgan wanted to clarify that the 1) the ADA lift would be for access to the second floor, 2) that Mr. Beal works with students on many diverse projects, and 3) that we are discussing possibilities for reducing costs in the future, Jennelle Carr seconded; motion carried 5-0.

**Superintendent's Report** - Supt. Paustian reported that she had sent a letter to House Speaker, Shap Smith regarding small school districts and their cost efficiency. She distributed a sum-



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mary of AOE proposals from the state. The Supt. has spoken with Robin Chesnut-Tangerman. She is concerned that we will lose the Small Schools Grant funds due to having class sizes of less than 20 students. Supt. Paustian talked about the importance of 1:1 technology in classrooms and its benefits in differentiated teaching to students of all abilities. Discussion also took place on the concept of "flipping" classrooms and how they work.

The meeting was suspended at 7:00 to move into the Public Informational Meeting.

The Public Informational Meeting was called to order by Clarence Haynes at 7:06PM.

**In Attendance:** Joan Paustian, Rick Beal, Louis Milazzo, Clarence Haynes, Meredith Morgan, Christopher Smid, Sarah Haley, and Jennelle Carr. **Public Present:** None

The Board read through the article regarding our school budget and "The Path Forward."

The Board discussed some of the options that were presented by Harry Frank of the VSBA, regarding what other schools/districts have done in consolidation situations.

Many of the funding options used in the past are no longer available.

No Public in attendance. The Public Informational Meeting was adjourned at 7:30PM. Continuation of Regular Meeting – 7:33PM

**Principal's Report** - Mr. Beal shared that the Winter Sports Program is going well and that the time the teachers are using for professional development has been very valuable. They are working on homework objectives, Math, Science, and Social Studies, and developing rubrics to connect to standards. Mr. Beal went to Berlin, VT for a Supervision/Evaluation Conference focused on ways to effectively evaluate teacher performance. On Feb. 10, the fourth graders took the NAEP tests; part of "The Nation's Report Card." Mr. Beal is hoping to bring PBL (Proficiency Based Learning) practices to our school; there will be a need to develop a team. Per the Energy Assessment Report, Mr. Beal and Mr. La-Bate will be addressing identified areas to improve the efficiency of the school building. Mr. Smid has another contact for Mr. Beal for an ADA lift which could be housed in a custodial closet and work internally; thereby reducing the cost from approximately \$100,000 to approximately \$70,000. Mrs. Morgan asked if the Board should consider getting a feasibility study done for a pellet system. Mr. Beal will work on this. Mr. Haynes noted that the school newsletter stated that students in grades 4/5 could lose ski/ snowboard/skating privileges due to tardiness.



The Board noted that we already consolidate services as much as possible, through bus contracts, sharing of itinerants, etc. To be considered, consolidation must be good for education and for taxpayers.

If, however, the town so votes, the constable only has the power to:

- serve civil or ciriminal process;
- assist the health officer in the discharge of his or her duties;
- destroy dogs when so ordered;
- kill injured deer;
- remove disprderly people from town meeting; and
- · collect taxes, if no tax collector is elected

There is no requirement that an elected constable have criminal justice training, however the voters can restrict the law enforcement activities of those constables who are untrained. 24 VSA § 1936a.

**Other Business:** There was a ballot petition inadvertently omitted from the ballot regarding Mentor Connector; we will discuss whether to fund this item directly. We will also discuss whether to contribute \$5,000 directly to the Town Audit reserve fund, as was approved by voters at 2014 Town Meeting. We may also discuss whether to do a reduced contract with the Sheriff's Department from Town budget.

### IV. Building & Site Design:

**A. Plans, elevations, cost estimates** – M Beattie brought a slide show of some of his past work and presented it so that the committee could get a feel for his aesthetic. After some discussion, D Munyak asked each committee member to find and bring photos of building styles and detail elements that they find appealing to the next meeting. If images are gleaned from the internet, D Munyak asked members to send him a link to the images so he can keep a running log.

D Munyak also told the committee of a suggestion that came from Herb Childress after viewing the town office picture board at the food sale. Herb suggested that it would be interesting to look at those pictures and rate them as to their appeal and appropriateness for us.

The discussion moved to the size of the building – one story or two – and whether or not a two story building would need a sprinkler system. M Beattie reported that he had done some research on the latest codes (NFPA & IBC) and gave the committee an overview of the basics. In short, making the building more fireproof, through the use of better grade materials, can mean that a 2 story or even a 3 story building would not have to include a sprinkler system.

### Seeking Committee Members for River Trail Feasibility Study!


As discussed and voted on at town meeting, the Select Board will work to

### Legislative Update

Representative Robin Chesnut-Tangerman

"The game is afoot!" That is what Sherlock Holmes would say to Dr. Watson when the wheels started turn-

ing, when the cat and mouse maneuvers began. When the chess got complicated.

Alright, so life in the Legislature isn't quite that dramatic, but the game is serious. At this point in the legislative session the House has shifted from developing policy to the political art of passing, or blocking, it. Have no doubt, there is still plenty of policy creation work to be done. The Natural Resources and Energy Committee, on which I sit, is now reviewing solar siting policy - where and how solar farms get developed, and Agriculture is looking at raw milk sales, to name just two areas of ongoing action.

But the "game" has moved from committee rooms to the House floor where the Revenue and Spending bills were just debated and passed. There were odd alliances, there were amendments proposed, amendments amended, withdrawn, and substituted. There were eloquent pleas, mind-numbing rows of numbers, political maneuvers, and long roll call votes. There is, or will be, spin doctoring and accusations of how the other guys are hurting "real Vermonters" who we, the good guys, are representing. The game is afoot.

Next we take up the Education, Healthcare, and Water Quality Bills, the amendments are piling up and the game will continue. But it is only the first round - because House bills will go to the Senate and their bills will come to us and the wrangling will begin anew.

But the amazing thing is that, unlike Washington DC, this works. The challenges and amendments can make the bills stronger and can clarify and define the underlying principles. For example, I recently introduced a small amendment to bill H.108, "an act relating to electrical installations". My amendment was accepted as friendly by the committee and approved by the full

House. Colleagues from all sides of the aisle agreed that it improved the underlying bill. The next day a Republican colleague introduced another amendment, essentially piggybacking onto mine. Hers was also approved by the full House and you know what? It also made the bill better. And that is how it is supposed to work.


