

Office Hours: By Appointment

The Treasurer's office is located solely in the Town Clerk's office. Responsibilities of the Treasurer include maintaining financial records of the Town and the School as well as receiving Current Year property taxes and paying orders drawn by the Select Board.

If you have any questions regarding Current Year Taxes, please call the above referenced office number. If I am not available, I will generally call back within 48 hours. Please do not hesitate to use e:mail as an alternative. If you'd like to meet with me in person, please call or e-mail to schedule an appointment.

Current Year Quarterly Property Taxes: Final payment for 2012 Property Taxes is due ON or before June 15th. The Town Office will be open to accept taxes in person on June 15th from 1pm to 4pm. Taxes received after June 15th will be considered delinquent and an 8% fee will be charged on the unpaid tax. Mailed checks with a legible 6/15 postmark will be accepted. Postmarks from 6/16 or later will be considered delinquent. NO EXCEPTIONS. Please plan your payment schedule accordingly: either mail your checks in a timely manner or make sure they are received when the town office is open. Thank you!

FAQs:

1. *When are taxes due?*
Taxes are due Quarterly in 4 equal installments. Mark your calendars for 2013 tax due dates: September 15, 2012, December 15, 2012, March 15, 2013, June 15, 2013.
2. *Where should I send my taxes and to whom should I make the check payable?*
Send checks to: **Town Treasurer, PO Box 1022, Middletown Springs, VT 05757**
Make checks payable to: **Middletown Springs Town Treasurer**
3. *Are postmarks accepted?*
Tax payments in envelopes postmarked on or before the 15th of the quarter are considered timely. Postmarks with the 16th or later will be considered late and will be assessed an interest charge.
4. *How much is the interest charge?*
Late payments for Sept, Oct, Nov: 1% each month
Late payments for each month thereafter: 1.5% each month.

5. *What methods of payment are acceptable to pay for Taxes?*

6. *When are taxes turned over to the Delinquent Tax Collector?*
Unpaid taxes for the Current Year will be turned over to the Delinquent Tax Collector on July 1st.
7. *Who is the Delinquent Tax Collector?*
Laura Castle is the newly elected Delinquent Tax Collector. Any questions regarding non-Current year taxes should be directed to Laura. She can be reached at the Town Office at 235-2220 and is available during her regular Town Clerk hours.
8. *When will new tax bills be sent out?*
Bills for tax year 2013 should be mailed to you in early August 2012.
9. *Can I have another copy of my Tax Bill?*
Yes, you can come to the town office to pick up a copy, or you can provide us with a Self-Addressed Stamped Envelope for us to send a copy to you.

Poster Contest Winners

The Vermont State Treasurer's Office introduced a program called "Reading is an Investment" to elementary schools last year. The program offers students in kindergarten through 6th grades the opportunity to learn about money and basic financial concepts. Our school received 3 new books and a recommended reading list that highlights books focusing on basic financial concepts. Students who read at least three books from the list and completed a personal reading requirement were eligible to enter in a statewide drawing for one of ten \$250 savings accounts in the Vermont Higher Education Investment Plan — Vermont's official 529 college savings plan. More than 2,200 students from 120 schools participated. We had 9 students participate but we had no winners drawn for the savings plan. HOWEVER WE DO have winners who entered into this year's poster contest!!

The poster contest theme this year was "Managing Money is not Magic!" In the elementary school division there were 146 entries. The first place winner receives a \$100 U.S. savings bond and their school a \$100 cash award in recognition of their support of financial literacy. The second and third place finishers receive a certificate and small gift.

AND (drum roll, please) Esther Mackenzie and Oisin Harrington placed second and third place respectively. Macy

ALL four students will receive \$10 to spend at the school book fair this spring and have the opportunity to travel to the State House for a ceremony and tour.

Wilson received honorable mention. Concepts were discussed during library classes but the students were given very little time in school to work on their poster. We can be very proud of these students who took it upon themselves to work on this project at home!

Call to Order: C. Larson called the meeting to order at 7:03 pm.

Approval of Minutes of 2/23: J. Webber moves to approve the 02/23 minutes as presented. S. Moyer 2nd. [S. Moyer – aye, M. Lamson – aye, C. Larson – aye, J. Webber – aye, C. Haynes – not present, motion carried]

Public Comments: Sally Achey, Lister – presents bill for hours to date. Sally registered for Grand List Seminar in Rutland for NEMERC.

(move into Garron Road Extension as part of public comments)

Garron Road Extension:

· A site visit was completed March 3 with adjoining property owners to determine whether there was physical evidence of the roadway

· C. Larson - Options on the table: approve, deny, or discontinue the road. M. Lamson would like confirmation from an alternative source other than the Riedinger attorney to determine whether the road is in fact a public right of way before acting.

· J. Thrasher (Riedinger attorney) inquires whether the board has adopted a conflict of interest policy modeled after the VLCT policy. J. Thrasher requests S. Moyer recuse due to a perceived conflict of interest based on relatives who live

on Garron Road. S. Moyer points out that she is acting on the best interest of the town and is not directly related to the residents on Garron Rd. J. Thrasher renews his request. S. Moyer indicates she will consider this option however retain her right to participate in the discussion as a resident.

· M. Lamson is not convinced that the road has not been thrown up and would like to evidence to the contrary prior to making a decision

· C. Larson opens the floor for discussion. Larry Moyer feels the board has the authority to deny the request and does not see a benefit to the town. Nancy Edmunds feels that the Riedinger's have an existing access to their property and would not benefit from a new entry. Cathy/Tom Lamontaine concerned about how the road may conflict with the water/wetlands/springs in the area and residents rely on these waters for wells.

Bob Tepper requests the exact statute in reference to the site visit be identified. C. Larson provides.

The board will confer with the town attorney to determine options and responsibilities of the town and will continue the discussion at future board meetings.

(move back in to public comments)

Public Comments:

Jenny Talke-Muniyak, new Town Treasurer, attends to discuss treasure position. Jenny requests to assign Laura Castle as Assistant Treasurer through the end of the fiscal year. C. Larson inquires whether Marilyn Parker would be available. C. Larson moves to appoint Laura Castle as Assistant Treasurer. S. Moyer second. [all in favor, motion carried]

C. Haynes requests income on the financial report be itemized.

Regarding the phone system, Jenny is planning to do most of the work out of the town office and requests an alternate phone line dedicated for the treasurer so that Laura does not have to take messages. The board suggests researching a phone system with alternate extensions for clerk, treasurer, listers and associated voicemail.

Discussion of initiating the process to obtain financing for the purchase of the Parker property as approved at town meeting. Jenny will research the options for next meeting.

Jenny will review the recommendations received from Graham and Graham who completed the town audit and will report back to the board next meeting

David Muniyak – suggests the board offer recognition to Marilyn Parker for her 30 years of service to the town as Treasurer. The board whole-heartedly agrees and will discuss.

Solid Waste/Fort Dumpster: Discussion of the implementation of single stream recycling and the changes necessary at the transfer station. M. Lamson will complete the implementation plan. C. Larson suggests a press release for Magnet and Front Porch. M. Lamson will complete.

Town Office Replacement Plan: Discussion of the management plan received 3/6 for the Parker property by Leggette, Brashears & Graham, Inc. (LBG). This document was prepared in conclusion of the site evaluation by the Rutland Regional Planning Commission. The document presents site remediation concerns as well as hypothetical costs for 3 development options for the site including green space, green space/parking, town office. The board had requested this document be delivered prior to town meeting which unfortunately did not happen.

M. Lamson spoke with John Diego of LBG who was at the Parker site removing the test wells. John mentioned LBG is willing to review the document with the board.

Discussion of the immediate course of action after closing which will be to initiate the process to remove the USTs (underground storage tanks), remove any hazardous materials from inside the storage building. LBG recommends addressing the exterior of the storage building to repair any damaged paint surfaces which may contain lead paint.

The Selectboard will work with the Building Committee moving forward. M. Lamson will send action plan to D. Munyak. C. Larson will contact Neil Vreeland as possible closing attorney.

Road Commissioner Report: Bill is not in attendance however leaves a note detailing action items/requests of the board: been working on class II grant/structure grant, putting together info to sell 90 International and 2005 1 ton in anticipation of new trucks. Inquires if we will be selling the 90 International sander? C. Haynes feels the sander should be kept as possible backup to inbed sander in the 2003 International.

Discussion of posting the roads. C. Haynes does not feel the roads need to be posted. The posting of roads will be revisited at next meeting.

The town was the high bidder by \$600 for the 2003 International plow-truck from the town of Bristol winning the bid at \$27,234. This vehicle will serve as a replacement for the 1990 International. Bristol Selectboard has approved and accepted Middletown's bid (4 bids were received all in close range, Middletown won bid by \$600) and requests a \$1,000 down-payment to cover advertisement costs until the truck is ready to be delivered in April. M. Lamson moves to authorize

the \$1,000 down-payment requested by the town of Bristol. C. Larson 2nd. [S. Moyer – nay, M. Lamson – aye, C. Larson – aye, J. Webber – aye, C. Haynes – aye, motion carried]

Highway Dept. Storage Plan: Discussion of the replacement of the pole barn which was budgeted for next fiscal year. C. Haynes inquires about selling the West Street property. S. Moyer will contact Bill Johnson to determine the process of floodplain/LOMA for the West Street property.

Street Lighting: None

Financials/Board Orders: C. Haynes moves to approve the general town orders as presented. C. Larson 2nd. [S. Moyer – aye, M. Lamson – aye, C. Haynes – aye, C. Larson – aye, motion carried]

C. Haynes moves to approve the highway town orders as presented. C. Larson 2nd. [S. Moyer – aye, M. Lamson – aye, C. Haynes – aye, C. Larson – aye, motion carried]

The Superior Court held a hearing 03/29 on Walter Pepperman's motion to compel compliance on the wording of the social service requests placed on the ballot. The town was represented through VLCT by Jim Carrol. The judge denied Mr. Pepperman's motion from the bench. C. Larson and C. Haynes were in attendance.

Other Business: S. Moyer seeks input regarding the request from the Riedinger attorney to recuse from the Garron Road discussion. The board feels she will act in the best interest of the town and it is a personal decision on how she would like to proceed.

Smart Meter Installation to Begin

Installation of Smart Meters is scheduled to begin in the next few weeks in Middletown Springs. Some residents have already received notice and installation dates, other notices are soon to follow.

At a February presentation on the CVPS Smart Grid initiative The Middletown Springs Energy Committee hosted representatives from Central Vermont Public Service and Wake Up, Opt Out, an organization that opposes wireless Smart Meters, who gave details of the Grid and Smart Meters.

Attendees asked questions and many expressed concerns about the Smart Grid installation that is part of a nationwide initiative. Utility companies are taking advantage of federal funding to bring "smarter" technologies to the current electric grid. It involves installing wireless digital control devices and communication technology, which will continuously relay information to utilities about equipment performance, potential or existing outages, electric demand, and usage.

Supporters say it's a big leap forward for energy conservation in Vermont. It will provide detailed and quick access to usage information that will save money and reduce response time to power outages. But, as installation has begun across the state, many people are questioning whether the new meters have enough safeguards to protect consumer's privacy. Some also fear the possible adverse health effects they say could result from widespread use of the wireless meters.

CVPS customers may now choose to "opt out" and retain a non-digital meter at their home without additional charges added to their bill for the foreseeable future by calling CVPS customer service: **1-800-649-2877**, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekdays, or 8 a.m. to 4 p.m on Saturday.

Superintendent's Report (Written): Supt. Paustian officially welcomed Karen Mach and Meredith Morgan to the School Board. New board members will receive a resource guide from the VSBA and a VT Education Law book. Training will also be offered. Kendra Larson and Clarence Haynes recommended the VSBA website which has very useful information. Mrs. Mach and Mrs. Morgan are encouraged to contact Dr. Paustian or her assistant, Mrs. Dente with any questions. Dr. Paustian reported that, within the RSWSU, two classroom teacher positions are open with 150 applications having been received. The Asst. Director of Special Education position for next year has been opened. Also, a H.S. Special Educator position is open. The goal is to fill vacancies in a timely manner. The in-service days in March will cover Math Common Core and NECAP item analysis. All SU budgets passed and Supt. Paustian is very pleased. MSES' special education caseload has grown; Mrs. Pettis is putting in much extra time and the addition of a 0.20 position may be necessary. There may be federal job funds available to cover the added expense in the current school year. Steven Letendre asked Supt. Paustian her

opinion of the recent Rutland Herald article regarding more rigorous math instruction in VT high schools. Supt. Paustian agrees with rigor for students and high expectations; high expectations are necessary in order for students to achieve.

Principal's Report (Written): Mr. Beal updated the board on a number of issues. We have a teacher for ASP Spanish and students continue to attend the program. Mr. Beal and Mrs. Pettis met with all the teachers, and Mr. Beal and Mrs. Wilkins also met with the teachers to review student needs and instruction. Mr. Beal feels strongly that increased collaboration and clear communication among all faculty and staff members is extremely important to student success and these are major goals. Three teachers went to Rutland N.E. School to observe "Foundations" reading lessons being taught in the primary grades. This is a very tactile program, focusing first on letters and sounds and building with each grade level. The final lighting inspection has been completed. Initial water system loan has been approved as well as a planning loan. These will be eligible for loan forgiveness. The scoreboard has been ordered and will be up for next year. The ASP "cigar box guitar" program will soon be featured in the *Rutland Herald*. We have three teams going to the Odyssey of the Mind Tournament and our basketball team is playing in a tournament at West Rutland. The Board expressed their appreciation for all of Mr. Beal's efforts and for being an advocate for kids.

Legislative News

This time of year at the State House many bills large and small are being voted out of committees and onto the “Floor” for consideration by the full House or Senate to then be sent to the other chamber. The fiscal bills originate in the House and recently we passed our appropriation “Big Bill” for Fiscal Year 2013. It included a general fund budget of \$1.3 billion and a total budget of all funds of \$5.01 billion. This is an increase of 6.4% over 2012 but about half of that involves continuing costs of Irene recovery. The state's transportation budget was also passed and increases funding for state and local highways, bridges, rail and municipal transit. Local town highway aid will increase for the first time in several years. A bill to invest in the Vermont working agricultural and forest economy passed by a large margin to help create businesses and jobs and to preserve the Vermont landscape.

Many complex and controversial bills remain in committee. A bill S.199 regarding a change in the exemptions for required childhood immunizations is being looked at in depth by the House Health Care committee and the House Agriculture committee is spending much time on a bill H.722 regarding the labeling of foods containing ingredients from genetically modified sources. A bill S.93 changing the labeling of grades of maple syrup is also being looked at as more syrup is being sold to international markets. And many legislators are discussing aspects of the proposed merger of the electrical utilities Central VT Public Service and Green Mountain Power.
