Strawberry Festival

Local artists, craftsmakers and musicians will join Historical Society volunteers to present the 45th Annual Middletown Springs Strawberry Festival. Admission is free.

Strawberry lovers are invited on Sunday, June 23 from 2-4 pm to the Historical Society on the Green. The festival features delicious strawberry shortcake

made with fresh Vermont strawberries, homemade biscuits, vanillaice cream and whipped cream, along with iced tea, lemonade or coffee.



Local artists and craftspeople will display and sell their work, including maple products, jewelry, photography, knitted items, honey and beeswax products. Items donated by Historical Society members and friends will also be for sale to benefit the organization.

The Peter Huntoon band, Tradewinds, will enliven the afternoon with classic '60s-'80s favorites, and there will be children's activities.

The Historical Society Museum will be open all afternoon, and every Sunday afternoon through October. Admission is free.

On view in the Museum is the exhibit "Saving Sylvanus", about Sylvanus Haynes (1768-1826), the first pastor of the Baptist church in Middletown. In addition are exhibits on the Montvert Hotel and Mineral Springs, and the Middletown History Timeline.

The Mineral Springs Park, located nearby, is open every day, year round.

The FINAL installment of Property Taxes (4th Quarter) for Tax Year 2018/2019 is due on or before Saturday,

June 15.

You can submit your 4th quarter property taxes in person, or mail them to PO Box 1022 with a June 15 (or earlier) postmark. Additionally, for your convenience, there is a drop box in the town office where you can drop off your payments during town office open hours. If you require a receipt, you MUST include a self addressed stamped envelope.

DON'T DELAY! A late 6/15 post office mailing will not necessarily generate a 6/15 postmark. A June 16 or later postmark WILL generate a LATE penalty of 8% in addition to the 1% interest penalty. Any unpaid 4th quarter taxes will be forwarded to the Delinquent Tax Collector for collection.

The Treasurer will be available to accept your tax payments on Saturday, June 15 from 9 am-2 pm at the town office.

Tax checks should be paid to: the Town of Middletown Springs. If paying with cash, please bring exact change as we do not keep cash in the town office.

50th Memorial Day Parade Thanks the Community

With excellent weather and high participation levels, the 50th anniversary parade was something to be proud of.

Thomas Hurcomb was instrumental in getting PEG-TV to cover the festivities, with Pat Hemenway and Chris Fenton announcing and Cheryl Mahoney providing background commentary. With an additional sound system, the announcers could also be heard by many parade watchers. PEG-TV has not yet scheduled when it will run the video, but watch for an announcement on Front Porch Forum. DVDs will be available to borrow at the library. The response to the running commentary was positive, and that will hopefully become a standard feature of the parade.

The parade was headed up by the West Rutland American Legion Color Guard, followed by veterans Robert Haynes, Rodney Kenyon, Sr., Clifford Kenyon, Jr., Emmett Francois, Tyler Manning, and Richard Alberty. Bright and beautiful floats from Spruce Knob, the Library, the Community Church, the Historical Society, Miss Ryan's Daycare, the Bush family, and Century 21, interspersed with

other marchers including the Girl Scouts, Theater in the Woods, Morgan Mountain Gardeners, Rutland County Democrats, the West Rutland ATV Sportsman's Club, Nick Seidner's Model-A antique truck, and a bevy of bicycles, dirt bikes and 4-wheelers, with the last float drawing a single Gold Star, plus over a dozen emergency vehicles and firetrucks from many surrounding towns, including the UVM Healthnet Critical Care Transport.

Parade and ceremony music was provided by the stalwart Mill River Marching Band, directed by Peter Roach. The band has been a key feature of the parade for decades. They bring not only well played music (with no repetitions!) but disciplined formation and beautiful uniforms. They deserve special commendation this year for bearing the heat with fortitude.

The ceremony was invoked by Rev. Matthews George and emceed by Stan Achey. Retired USN Lieutenant Commander Emmett Francois led the Pledge of Allegience. Barby Carr sang "America the Beautiful," followed by Sally Achey's reading of "Letter to a Combat Veteran," written by Gold Star Mother Denise Williams whose son died in Iraq on November 1, 2010.

Two recitations by the 5th and 6th graders were directed by their teacher Jenn Tifft. Her extraordinary efforts in inspiring her students to commit to writing, editing, and delivering a choral reading last year and this year, plus her preparing and rehearing them for that reading and for their memorized recitation of "In Flanders Fields" by Canadian poet John McRae have made these student recitations a greatly appreciated part of our Ceremony on the Green. These students write and speak from the heart, providing inspiration to us all. As one observer said, "For us elders, seeing kids delivering poetry from memory — and showing such obvious pride and purpose in doing so — is heartening, and a good way of building community and reliance upon their classmates. Without their trust in each other, they could not pull off this feat!"

Stuffed Animal Sleepover:


Tuesday, July 30 Drop off 2-7 pm

News from the School

It has been a most successful year of education at MSES. Students have learned a great deal in both academic and social arenas. Spring MAPs (Measures of Academic Progress) testing has been completed and will demonstrate the areas where students are strong and where they may need additional support, guiding our instruction moving forward. On that note, our Summer Program is designed to assist students in gaining or maintaining academic progress and provides opportunities for structured socialization with their peers.

Our annual Summer Program takes place three days per week for four weeks (on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday). This year, the program will run July 9 - August 1. The program is open to MSES students entering first grade and up. During the morning, students work on academics in small groups. These academic sessions plus a snack and beverage are provided free of charge. Pick-up time for those students attending only the morning sessions is 12:00 noon.

At noon, students registered for afternoon activities sessions will have recess followed by lunch. After lunch, students will participate in fun, enriching activities, both indoors and outdoors. There is a one-time fee of \$15 per student for the entire four weeks of Afternoon Activities (payable no later than the first day of the program). Scholarships are available if payment is a barrier to participation.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the community members and organizations that have supported us this school year through volunteerism, donations, attendance at our Spaghetti Dinner, Pot Luck, student shows, and concerts. Your support is vital to the success of our school.

Call the Town Office if you aren't sure about the status of your dog's rabies certification. A 50% penalty on the original fee will be assessed for all registrations after April 1, 2019.
